Atmost a century ago scientists observed that quartz crystals vibrate at an absolutely constant frequency when an electric current is passed through them. But quartz digital watches did not become practical until miracles of miniaturization were developed to save weight and room in space crafts. Quartz one of the world's common minerals lies at the heart of every digital watch. The typical crystal in the watch powered by a miniature battery vibrates many times per second. The vibrations are fed into a tiny chip which is crammed with transistors and other components. Battery, Crystal and chip combine to produce remarkably accurate watches whose timekeeping rarely strays by more than one or two seconds each month. This microscopic maze is the watch's brain and can be designed to store a remarkable amount of information. It's most important single function is to keep dividing the vibrations by two until the quartz is pulsing precisely once every second.

B) Write a summary of the given passage and provide an appropriate title.

It has been the declared policy of the government to promote the use of Indian languages at all levels. Implementation of this policy at the operations level demands that young men and women choosing the regional languages as media of instruction are in no way at a disadvantage in securing jobs within the state or outside.

The recent UPSC examination ruling on this point has created, for the first time, a situation where a student using the Indian languages is not debarred from competing for the highest posts under the government. It is, in fact, necessary that all other competitive examinations, including those for entrance to the Defence Academy, the Indian Institute of Technology and other all-India professional institutions, must also be thrown open to candidates using Indian languages.

The present emphasis on English as a medium of instruction is one of the factors accentuating the stratification and elitism in our society as also the alienation of the literate from the illiterate. There is a considerable overlap between institutions which charge relatively high fees



and those which offer English as the medium of instructions. Also, rural candidates have special difficulties in competing through English.

To make a case for promoting the increased use of regional languages is not to be construed as antagonism to English. English will continue to be a valuable window to the developments in the outside world. English should certainly continue to be an additional language of study, proficiency in which would be useful for communication with the outside world, or for commerce or scholarship. But the approach to its teaching and learning should be functional. For the relatively small number of candidates who have passed the selection test on the basis of their abilities and aptitudes (independently of their proficiency in English), it should be possible to arrange intensive post-selection courses in English, when necessary.

In general, emphasis must shift from demanding a proficiency in English before selection for a course / job to making it possible to attain such proficiency (or even demanding the acquisition of such proficiency where functionally necessary) after selection. The government and the public sector (including banks and the LIC) would have to set the pace in this matter.
